Welcome

To me, this year has been a phoenix year. By that I mean the school has risen from the ashes of a lost two years, two years where the world has been in chaos. PIGGIES MAKE AMARK

During the summer term Mrs Eades and Miss Shipley introduced a selection of traditional tales to the children in Kindergarten and Nursery starting with The Three Little Pigs.

The well-known story follows a repetitive pattern where many key phrases appear again and again, which encourages the children to join in, helping to develop their communication and language. They also begin to recognise many printed letters in the story text, which they have been learning through listening and rhyming games, and enjoy replicating and using these in their own drawing and writing.

There are many emotions to discuss when reading versions of this story: the pigs feel excited to build their new houses, the pigs feel worried when they encounter the wolf, the wolf feels angry and frustrated when he can't blow the house

down. Exploring and naming these emotions is a very important part of their personal, social and emotional development, so that they can begin to make sense of and communicate how they feel.

To help the children develop their creative and expressive art skills they were encouraged to look closely at the features of the pigs and to draw and paint what they saw. They also enjoyed using junk modelling materials to create houses and items to help the piggies - or the wolf!

Naturally with this story the children showed a keen interest in building things and were provided with their own construction yards. They tested out the strength of different building materials and enjoyed opportunities to practise decision-making and social skills such as sharing and collaborating.


Mastering Shadow Puppetry

London's Burning

Fire, fire! Fetch the engines! The children in Form 2 were transported back in time to 1666 to learn about the devastation caused by the Great Fire of London.

Taking part in a workshop hosted by expert historians Portals to the Past they investigated different historical sources to interpret the cause of the fire and how the events of the night unfolded as the medieval city was destroyed. Through drama-based activities they learnt how residents tackled the blaze using equipment stored in churches at the time and enthusiastically sang London's Burning as they attempted to put the fire out and save London.



Life in Medieval Times

Following in the footsteps of the Normans, Form I enjoyed a fascinating visit to historical Tamworth Castle and were transported back to experience first-hand what life was like in medieval times.

Their journey started in the Grand Dining Room where they helped the Lady's servant prepare the dining table for the Lord and Lady of the castle. Handling replicas of historical items and through role play they explored the differences between rich and poor, then and now, continuity and change.

An interactive workshop taught them how the castle was used as a defensive structure, who had lived at the castle and what it took to be a squire and knight in the medieval times. They participated in a bill drill, marching with a bill hook and enjoyed visiting the tower and the battlements for a birds-eye view across the Staffordshire countryside.

CELEBRATING WORLD RELIGIONS

We aim to support children in deepening their understanding of their own beliefs as well as understanding more about the beliefs of others and to celebrate diversity. During the summer term Form 3 discussed how Muslims celebrate during the month of Ramadan and the importance of The Holy Qur'an as a sacred script. There were hurdles along the way and the teams soon discovered engineers need to be both creative and good problem solvers as they collaborated to improve and refine their prototype designs. At the start of the academic year Zoë's Place Baby Hospice Coventry was unveiled as our beneficiary school charity for the year.


The long-established children's charity provides palliative, respite and end of life care to babies and infants suffering from life-limiting or
